Becoming Present — an Advent Ritual

"What Can I Give Him" arranged by Mark Hayes

Carl Bishop Jr: Today we will read the words of Isaiah offering a prophetic vision that Jesus then claims for his ministry. Likewise, we are called to claim the gift of being fully present with all people — those who mourn, those who grieve, those who have suffered indignity and oppression. Mary's Magnificat is prophetic as well. She claims the overturning of injustice even before it has come to pass. In the difficulty of her situation, she "sings" with joy about the very real presence of God growing within her.

Deb Rose: We unwrap a present on this third Sunday of Advent with great anticipation for the gift that God will reveal.

☐ The Word Present Among Us: Proclaiming ☐

First Readings

Isaiah 61: 1-4; 10 and Psalm 126: 1-3

Carl Bishop Jr. The prophet Isaiah declares in this morning's excerpt from chapter 61 that there is great joy when we know, and do, what is right. This scripture was powerful in the time when the Babylonian exile was over and the Hebrew people needed the words to express their praise and thanks. And it was powerful when Jesus used these same words to refer to the heart of the purpose of his ministry. Salvation from oppression and the joy of God continue to proceed through the ages to hand-in-hand. Let us read responsively:

God has sent me to bring good news to those who are poor;

to heal broken hearts;

to proclaim release to those held captive

and liberation to those in prison;

to announce a year of favor from YHWH, and the day of God's vindication;

to comfort all who mourn, to provide for those who grieve in Zion — to give them a wreath of flowers instead of ashes,

the oil of gladness instead of tears, a cloak of praise instead of despair.

They will be known as trees of integrity, planted by YHWH to display God's glory.

They will restore the ancient ruins, and rebuild sites long devastated; they will repair the ruined cities, neglected for generations... They will be known as trees of integrity,

planted by YHWH to display God's glory. I will joyfully exult in YHWH, who is the joy of my soul!

The Psalms are also written in the same time period — some poems of lament from exile and some written in the style of praise after the exile is over. Psalm 126 refers to the almost-unbelievable joy of returning to the homeland.

When YHWH brought us captives back to Zion, we thought we were dreaming! Our mouths were filled with laughter then, our tongues with songs of joy.

And from the nations we heard, "Their God has done great things for them."

Yes — YHWH has done great things for us, and we are filled with joy.

Witness to the Word "The Blessing of Christmas"

Gospel Reading

Luke 1: 41-55

Deb Rose: Luke is the Gospel author we draw from this week. The account of Mary visiting Elizabeth is the context for a description of joy that resides even in the midst of uncertainty and possible harm to Mary, the young pregnant woman at the margins of society. She believes with her whole heart that the child in her womb is just as the angel has declared... a gift from God, of God, the holiest of matter.

As soon as Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb and

Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit. In a loud voice she exclaimed, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb! But why am I so favored, that the mother of the Messiah should come to me? The moment your greeting reached my ears, the child in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed is she who believed that what our God said to her would be accomplished!" Mary said:

"My soul proclaims your greatness, O God, and my spirit rejoices in you, my Savior.

So now go and be truly present so you may be a gift of presence for others.

That's all that is expected — that the gift that is YOU is the best gift you can give.

In the name of the Holy Presence, the Divine Gift, and the Spirit of Joy that is just waiting for us to unwrap abundant life.

☐ Fully Present in the Moment: Praying ☐

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Prayers of the People "Right Here, Right Now"

Sung slowly

Right here and right now we open our senses to see and perceive the gifts we've been given, to know and believe that what we must do is open our hearts to let all gifts flow through.

Leader: As we have done for the last two weeks, we will begin our prayers by taking time to stay fully present in this moment as we approach the holy mystery of Christmas. Too often we are afraid to allow joy to creep in, buoyed by small, ordinary things. How can we have joy when there is so much suffering? Being present with joy in the world is a subversive act as we proclaim that despair is dispelled when we make a connection with another. And in that connection, is connection to the ever-present God.

We will begin our prayers with three questions, each followed by a short silence. Focusing intentionally on thoughts and memories can be a kind of prayer, bringing our lives into a conversation with the Holy. I invite you to take a deep breath and close your eyes if you are comfortable doing that.

The first question is this: Who was a gift of presence to you this week? Did you experience their attention in a way that felt like a special connection? Take a moment to recall this in your mind's eye, seeing it emerge like opening a gift. If you cannot recall such a moment, it is OK... this week you will notice these moments more deeply.

The second question is this: How did you offer yourself as a gift of presence? What did it feel like to extend your attentiveness and availability beyond yourself? Did you notice how it made a difference to someone else for you to be truly present to them?

The third question is this: Is it possible that God's presence is felt more acutely in these moments when we truly tend to one another? What could you do this coming week that would allow God's gift of Joy to flow through you to someone

else? It may be as simple as finding opportunities to speak an encouraging word. Or as complex as actually lifting up someone's circumstances through volunteering or donating.

In doing this, we allow you to meet us in the right here, right now, right where we are.
